## HERD HEALTH TO-DO LIST FOR LIVESTOCK

- \* Vaccinate equine (horses, donkeys, mules) against West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine
- Encephalomyelitis. Take precautions to minimize standing water where mosquitoes breed.
- \* Feed cattle a COMPLETE mineral mix with Hi-Magnesium to help prevent grass tetany.
- \* Check pastures for toxic plants or trees and treat accordingly. Repair fences, barns and working facilities to reduce the chance of injury.
- \* Keep a close eye on ALL livestock grazing lush forage growth for potential problems.

Use good judgment and read the labels when returning livestock to pastures that have been recently fertilized or treated for weeds.

#### FORAGE MANAGEMENT TIPS

\* If you have not fertilized, it's getting late for cool season grass (fescue and orchard grass) so get some advice before applying. Spreading late could benefit weeds more than the grass. If you decide to fertilize, think about split applications to spread out the forage growth.

\* Identify problem weeds and spray if you have not already. Different types of weeds come up at different times of the year so make a weed control plan for the whole growing season.

\* Develop a grazing plan for your operation to help you utilize the forage efficiently. Overgrazing as well as under grazing will reduce forage vigor and stimulate weed growth.

### **GENERAL MANAGEMENT TIPS**

\* Work on hay equipment now instead of when you need it.

\* Cattle producers need to be feeding a High-Mag mineral free choice to reduce the risk of cattle getting Grass Tetany.

\* Make cost effective decisions on fertilizing grassland.

\* Get those hooves checked out by your farrier. Winter was tough on feet and legs.

\* Plan your war against worms & flies NOW! Use the most cost effective options.

Flies are attracted to ALL livestock and poultry because manure and leftover feed are food sources for them. Flies can reduce animal performance as well as irritate human and animal alike. The recent weather has been pretty wet setting-up a potential banner year for flies. Make your battle plans now. Don't wait until the animals are covered, your outside activities are invaded or even worse, your neighbors complain and relationships might be strained. Please contact me for options to control flies early before they become a major problem.



#### VALUE ADDED PRE-CONDITION FEEDER CALF SALE

The Statesville Area Feeder Calf Sale Committee is hosting a Value Added Pre-Condition Feeder Calf Sale this year. The sale will be Thursday, July 24<sup>th</sup> and has some new requirements that will make the sale more successful. The new rules include:

\* Weaned no later than June 10, 2014

- \* Weigh at least 400 lbs. on July 24<sup>th</sup>
- \* 2 rounds of Bovishield Gold Live
- \* 1<sup>st</sup> round of Ultrabac 7/Somubac
- \* 2<sup>nd</sup> round of One Shot Ultra
- \* Dewormed and Tagged
- \* Males must be castrated and healed prior to June 10

The committee also agreed to pay 5/head up to 20 head for the vaccines. There must be a minimum of 400 head of like cattle consigned by the weaning deadline of June  $10^{th}$ . Extension will help with the vaccination process and will pre-grade your cattle on the farm to help you send quality cattle that will enhance the sale and the reputation of southeast cattle.

If you are interested in becoming BQA Certified, we can train you during the vaccination process and you can take the test at home or come to the office. At the Grading Workshop in early March, David LeMaster said that feedlots like southeastern cattle they just needed them to be better vaccinated and healthy when they got off the trucks. This is a good chance to show the feedlots we have the kind of cattle they want and they are worth the extra premium that value added cattle demand.

LOOKING FOR SOME GOOD CHICKENS

It is time again for the spring Hy-Line Brown pullet sale. They are vaccinated against: Newcastle, Bronchitis, Fowl pox, Bovine, A.E., L.T. and Marek's disease. These pullets will begin to lay shortly after their delivery. The source is Snider Poultry Company, Staley NC. **The pick up point is West Rowan Farm, Home, and Garden, (formerly known as Steele Feed and Seed), Mt. Ulla, NC. The price is \$6.75. The number is limited, so order soon.** <u>Remember to bring your own crates.</u>

The Iredell County Cooperative Extension and West Rowan Farm, Home, and Garden will take orders for pullets and roosters and pass them along to the supplier. If you want to order pullets, please call the Iredell Extension Office at 704-873-0507 before Monday, May 12, 2014. No orders will be taken after this date. So that we can have an accurate number, please call in as soon as possible. The delivery date is Thursday, May15 from 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Please leave your phone number when you place your order.

## **HORSE MANAGEMENT TIPS**

Start hunting hay for the upcoming winter months. Make contacts and find the hay that you feel is the best buy and meets your horse's nutritional needs. Many producers are getting ready to start mowing and now is a good time to get your foot in the door. If you have a place to store hay, buying hay out of the field can sometimes save you some money. Don't wait until snow is on the ground and you are out of hay to start looking.

With spring and summer comes beautiful weather as well as hot humid days. While we can go inside and enjoy a cold drink, our equine friends are mostly left to fend for themselves. Be sure to make preparations to provide your horses with shade, lots of cool clean water, and fly protection. When horses are hot, lack water or are irritated by flies, they become stressed and that weakens the horse's immunity, increasing the chances of illness and giving the horse an un-thrifty condition.
