Spotted Lanternfly

Well, we no longer have to wonder about the spotted lanternfly. Recently, it was detected in North Carolina for the first time. On June 29th, the NCDA&CS announced an infested area in Kernersville, NC in Forsyth County. The NCDA&CS continues to survey the infestation and are already starting treatment to reduce the population.

The spotted lanternfly is an invasive insect native to Asia. They use piercing-sucking mouthparts to feed on plant phloem. Agriculturally, the threat is primarily to grapevines. They also feed on fruit trees, native trees, and more. The spotted lanternfly is not suspected to cause tree mortality, like grapevines. But they will retrieve nutrients from the plant, weakening it.

Early detection and rapid response are important to the control of the spotted lanternfly. Residents are asked to be on the lookout for the spotted lanternfly and report it to NCDA&CS. This pest has been rapidly spreading since it was first identified in Pennsylvania in 2014.
